

### Portland's Housing Needs

### 2045 HOUSING NEEDS ANALYSIS

Portland faces a wide range of housing needs — and challenges to meet these needs. The 2045 Housing Needs Analysis (HNA) recognizes that some communities face bigger challenges than others.

The HNA identifies a need for more housing — especially for low-income households, communities of color, elders, people with disabilities, and people experiencing houselessness.

# Portland needs ...

## 55,000 new units by 2032

(roughly 6,000 units per year)

to "catch up" from underproduction and for households experiencing houselessness

## 120,560 new units by 2045

(average of 5,200 units per year)

to meet the overall need for housing

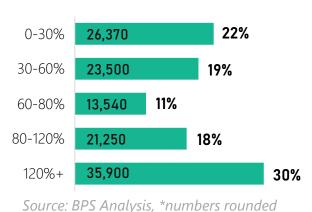


417,060 units in 2045 41% increase from 2021

#### WHAT DOES THE HOUSING NEED LOOK LIKE?

The City must accommodate a variety of Portlanders' needs with a range of unit types, prices and locations, including low-income populations, communities of color, and people of all ages and abilities.

## Total new units\* needed by income affordability (% of area median income)



▶ 53% of new units should be affordable to households earning 80% AMI or below.

## **HOUSING PRODUCTION STRATEGY**

The <u>Draft Housing Production Strategy</u> (HPS) is a five-year action plan, which includes strategies and actions to promote the building of needed housing.

The HPS focuses on more equitable and affordable housing options for a wider range of incomes, needs, and preferences.

#### PROPOSED STRATEGY CATEGORIES

- A. Promote affordable housing: Increase the supply of regulated and unregulated affordable housing units.
  - Example: Explore replacing housing bonds revenue source.
- **B.** Increase homeownership: Improve homeownership rates, retention, and choice for people of color and others who have been historically underserved and under-represented.
  - Example: Create new middle-income financial incentives.
- **C. Increase access to opportunity:** Ensure equitable access to housing in safe, healthy neighborhoods with convenient access to jobs, goods and services. *Example: Study zoning bonuses and incentives.*
- D. Reduce barriers to development and improve processes: Address regulatory impediments to building needed housing. Example: Implement regulatory reform project.
- E. Stabilize current and future households: Support current and future households to reduce housing insecurity and prevent houselessness. *Example: Preserve existing affordable housing.*
- F. Promote age- and disability-friendly housing: Ensure equitable access to housing for people with disabilities and older adults.

  Example: Educate on opportunities for aging in place and community.
- **G.** Promote climate-friendly and healthy homes: Increase access to high-performance housing for Portlanders of all abilities and income levels. *Example: Support mass timber and modular innovations.*
- H. Advocate at the state and federal level: To address some issues, the City will need policy changes or funding at the state and federal level. Example: Advocate for preservation of expiring regulated affordable units.
